

Terrick Terrick National Park bird list

There are four distinct habitat areas within the park:

- A Rocky outcrops and ridges, e.g Mount Terrick Terrick (Mitiamo Rock) and Reigel Rock
- B open woodlands, e.g. mixed woodland east of the cemetery
- C grassland plains
- D along Bendigo Creek plus dams (e.g. eastern end of Allan Track, off Mitiamo-Kow Swamp Road)

This check list has four blank columns after the name of each bird: each column can be used for a particular area or date.
